Microsoft Word, unsurprisingly, has a way of doing this. You may be wondering why you would want to turn off spellchecking for a specific document. There are many reasons. You may like to leave a feature in most documents, but they have one where it distracts you. Or, you may have a boiler room where you use filler words (such as Word's Lorem Ipsum feature). Or maybe you want to get tested and see how many mistakes you make. Whatever the reason, you can do it in a few simple steps. Hide spelling and grammatical errors specific to a document with an open document, switch to the File tab. Then select Options from the bottom of the left pane. Now the Word Options window will appear. Select the Proof tab here. At the very bottom of the window, select Hide spelling errors only in this document and Hide grammatical errors in this document only. Click OK. This will now remove the grammar and spelling checker only for the document you are currently working in. Be careful that this setting is document-specific and will still apply even after you submit it, so be careful! By using the Spelling and Grammar options within Word, you can quickly reset grammar and spelling checks back to their original settings. You will be able to start setting your options for proving fresh. Open Spelling and Grammar in Words. For Word 2003, select Tools, Options, and click the Spelling & Grammar tab. In Word 2007, click the Windows Office button in the upper-left corner, click Word Options at the bottom of the menu, and click Proofing in the left workplace. Among the entire group of participants, 65% said such errors were unacceptable and only 18.6% said otherwise. While spelling mistakes and grammatical stains can happen to anyone, some survey respondents said spelling and grammar mishaps are a problem in their industry. The industry where the pre-owners were found to be the most impossible was business and support logistics at almost 88%. Both the marketing and state industries followed about 71%. Respondents also told the researchers that the biggest critics of their typographical errors would be their bosses. According to the survey, nearly 76% of respondents said their boss's response to the mistake would range between slightly annoyed (40.8%), quite annoyed (26.6%) and that would be a big problem (8.2%). Only 24.5 percent of respondents said their boss wouldn't care at all. The positions are even worse for anyone trying to slip into a new workplace. Nearly 80% said they would not consider hiring someone with spelling or grammatical error on their CV. Americans have average spelling and grammar skillsAlong with a study of how spelling and grammatical errors are perceived in the workplace, researchers tested subjects for their skills. When asked which subjects they were most present in from school, both men and women felt they were well above average in understanding reading, spelling and grammar. To test subjects' confidence, the researchers asked them 13 spelling, grammar and punctuation questions. What they found was that the respondents were actually quite average, earning 75%, which would be a C grade in most high school English classes. Respondents in industry, advertising and marketing had the highest scores. Entertainment and leisure workers, telecommunications, finance and nonprofits rounded out industries with the highest five ratings. Researchers also reviewed test scores based on a generation of subjects and whether they attended public or private school. What they found was that there was almost zero correlation between these two criteria. Looking at test scores from a generational angle, baby boomers (70.4%), Generation X (74.6%), millennials (76.1%) and Generation Z (74.1%) all have achieved a similar There is an even smaller difference in grades when comparing a private school (75.5%) and public schools (75%).
